French & History

We are pleased to have our trips programme return to normal again, see below for a snapshot of what happened when French and History visited France!

Paris (November 10 2022 - November 13 2022)

Day 1

After much anticipation we arrived at LAET very early (5:30am) to meet our coach driver and off we went! The real fun began when the History and French students explored Montmartre. We climbed up many stairs but were rewarded with the most beautiful view looking down onto the city of Paris. As we admired the view, adjacent to us were the famous love locks that contained special messages. To our surprise we also saw a wall full of "I love you" messages in multiple languages. It definitely added more love to the city of love.

Day 2

After spending time around the Eiffel Tower in the day, we took a French revolution tour but on a boat! We boarded the boat at the Tour Eiffel stop and saw the Invalides, Musée D'Orsay, Saint-Germain-Des-Près, Notre Dame and Jardin des Plantes - getting off at Hôtel de Ville. From there we took a lovely walk to our main activity that day - the Louvre. Fortunately, we had the honour to go inside and had a treasure hunt in groups. We saw the Mona Lisa and learned more about the artists and their works of art.

Day 3

Palace of Versailles!

We visited the enormous, stunning palace that Louis XVI and his wife Marie Antoinette lived in - it is closer to Paris than you think. Using voice guides along the way we saw history with our own eyes such as: the Hall of Mirrors. Afterwards, we had lunch in the huge, beautiful gardens of the Palace and got to explore. We then continued our tour of the French Revolution - Bastille, Notre Dame, and certain philosophers' homes.

Day 4

The French students met local students, played boules with them, spent the day together and learned about life as a student in Paris. Meanwhile, the History students continued exploring Paris.

Music

Music at LAET continues to grow and in the past two terms nearly 100 students have taken part in music-making in instrumental lessons, group performances and taster sessions. The launch of instrumental lessons last summer has seen numbers rise significantly and we now have more than 30 students learning violin or piano, with more waiting to begin saxophone and flute from this term. We had our first ever performance showcase from the piano students on December 12 2022 led by our brilliant piano teacher, Ms Bako.



Rap and production clubs are going strong with singing workshops and gospel choir performances a highlight for the Elderly Residents' home outreach event before Christmas. There are plans to start an instrumental group moving forward for new students learning instruments.



We've also had a great time joining forces in LAET/Highgate ventures this year. Rehearsals have culminated in performances including a showcase concert at the Roundhouse Studio Theatre last April, a trip to the LSO digital Tech Group for music production and recording, a performance on the Wireless Stage at Finsbury Park in July, and a rap cypher session with renowned artist Capo Lee.



Two LAET students (Baaba Y13 and Chris, Alumnus) were selected to perform a duet together at the National Festival of Music for Youth in Birmingham, and subsequently at the Royal Albert Hall.

Exciting music opportunities coming up include a joint concert at iconic jazz venue, Pizza Express Dean Street, Soho in March, and the very special showcase of LAET musicians at Kings Place in April. Music is thriving, and the future looks bright to give students every opportunity moving forward with the school offering A Level from September 2023. Careers Highlights

Natixis

On January 23 2023, 35 Y13 students visited the Natixis Corporate & Investment Banking offices for an insight day in conjunction with Natixis Investment Managers. Debate

After attending after school debate sessions for two months, students were given the chance to showcase their skills and talents in the competition in front of barristers from Three Raymond Buildings.

After four teams won in the initial rounds, the judges looked at the performances of individual speakers before deciding on the finalists. The final motion, "This house believes that the royal family should be abolished," was contested between the proposition (Aayah Abubakar, Emmanouil Katakalos and Andrea Kabugo), and the opposition (Aimee Foster, Levent Dogan and Hannah Milling). After a lively debate featuring many strong points and following fifteen minutes of deliberation by the barristers, the proposition were narrowly awarded the victory and received a custom trophy and prizes.

The final prize of the evening was for best speaker which was a close contest between Aimee and Aayah, but was awarded to Aayah for her speech in the final.

Safeguarding & Wellbeing

Online Safety

The internet is a great educational resource for young people but it is important that parents and carers work together with schools to mitigate the risk that young people face online.

In school, we take steps to monitor and control access to the information students can access online via their school devices. The internetmatters.org site offers guidance on parental controls across a range of devices and broadband providers.

On January 23 2023, parents were invited to an online safety workshop which addressed some important steps to keep young people safe online.

We would advise parents and carers to speak to young people about:

- Communication risks
- Viewing risks
- Sharing risks

The guidance below provides a good starting point for conversations about online safety:

Have a conversation

It is really important to chat with your children on an ongoing basis about staying safe online. Not sure where to begin? These conversation starter suggestions can help.

- **Ask your children to tell you about the sites they like to visit and what they enjoy doing online.**
What games do you and your friends like to play online? Can you show me the websites you visit the most? Shall we play your favourite game online together?
- ▲ **Ask them about how they stay safe online.**
What tips do they have for you, and where did they learn them? What is OK and not OK to share?
- **Ask them if they know where to go for help.**
Where can they go to find the safety advice, privacy settings and how to report or block on the services they use?
- ◆ **Think about how you each use the internet.**
What more could you do to use the internet together? Are there activities that you could enjoy as a family?
